### MSID Spring of 2024 Dakar, Senegal

Last semester (Spring 2024), I had the opportunity to study international development in Dakar, Senegal. In particular, the program emphasized the difficulties of pushing Indigenous development in a society that was and continues to be ravaged by imperialism, colonialism, neoliberalism, and globalization. While there, I chose to examine these topics through the frameworks of both sustainability and entrepreneurship. Through these courses, I learned about and experienced some of the realities and lived experiences of individuals in Senegal.

In addition to the classroom phase, I also had the opportunity to complete a six-week internship at the Hôpital Traditionelle de Keur Massar in a suburb of Dakar. At the hospital, individuals are diagnosed and treated through the use of plants. Additionally, the individuals in charge put particular emphasis on protecting the medicinal plants in their hospital and the cultural knowledge surrounding each of them.
