OH Legislative Fellowship Program

A paid, full time, 13 month position, available to December or May college graduates. Fellows are paid \$31,200 annually with an opportunity to earn an additional bonus of up to \$2,000 upon completion of the program.

New York State Assembly Programs

Paid positions from January to May open to college juniors or seniors and graduate students. <u>UNDERGRADUATE INTERNSHIPS</u>: Application deadline is **November 1.** Open to current college juniors and seniors. Session runs Jan – May. (Stipend of \$6,200 awarded & college credit is an option). Application must be mailed by dept. liaison.

<u>GRADUATE INTERNSHIPS:</u> Application deadline is **September 14**. Open to students who are currently enrolled in or have recently graduated from a graduate school program. Session runs from January – June. (Stipend of \$15,000)

James C. Gaither Junior Fellows program

The James C. Gaither Junior Fellows program, through the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, offers approximately 12-14 students one-year fellowships beginning on August 1 in Washington D.C. Open to graduating college seniors and individuals who have graduated during the past academic year. Students are selected from a pool of nominees nominated by several hundred participating universities and colleges. Fellows work as research assistants to Carnegie's senior scholars in a variety of areas such as Democracy, Conflict, and Governance, U.S. Foreign Policy and Diplomacy, Cyber and Nuclear policy, etc.

The current salary for 2018 is \$3,291.67 per month/\$39,500 per year.
